In 528, Eastern Roman Emperor Justinian I (527-565) brought together a professor, two lawyers, and seven civil servants and gove there a room in his palace. He had them codify Roman law in Latin, combing through 20,000 sources dating back to the time of Hadrian.

The laws composed of 4500 articles written by this council were published as Codex Justinianos in 529...
